RECYCLING GUIDELINES

WE DO NOT ACCEPT RECYCLABLES IN PLASTIC BAGS

MATERIAL	WHAT CAN BE RECYCLED	WHAT <u>CANNOT</u> BE RECYCLED AT THIS TIME	HOW TO PREPARE MATERIALS FOR RECYCLING
Glass Recycle Cart or Bin	Clear, brown, amber and green beverage bottles and food jars	Broken glass, light bulbs, dishes, drinking glasses, mirrors, ceramics, Pyrex or tempered glass	Rinse bottles and jars, Remove & discard lids, Do not break glass (labels may be left on)
Aluminum, Steel and Bi-Metal Cans Recycle Cart or Bin	Food and beverage cans	Aluminum foil, cans containing food, clothes hangers, scrap metal, screws, nails, toys, lawn furniture, paint cans, aluminum siding	Rinse cans (crush if space is needed) Please push lid down inside of can
Plastics (PET, HDPE) Stamped #1 Or #6 on bottom Recycle Cart or Bin	Plastic containers #1 through #6 on bottoms, clear and green plastic soda bottles, Milk and water jugs, Liquid detergent, bleach and softener bottles, Hair care bottles	Plastic containers #7, Styrofoam peanuts and blocks, plastic plant pots, foam plastic egg cartons, plastic wrap, bubble wrap, plastic bags (loose nor bundled), CD & DVD's, toys, lawn furniture, motor oil, cooking oil, herbicide, antifreeze	Discard lids and rinse container. (crush if space is needed) (LIDS ARE NOT RECYCLABLE, BE SURE TO REMOVE & DISCARD IN TRASH)

Cardboard: Recycle Cart <u>ONLY</u>  Call Customer Service to request a Recycle Cart.	<u>Clean</u> Corrugated & Pressed Cardboard Cartons (moving & shipping boxes, such as TV, computer, large appliance, boxes, etc), cereal boxes, and shoe boxes	Paperboard boxes including tissue boxes, pizza boxes, milk cartons, juice boxes, take-out food containers, oily, soiled, or contaminated cardboard	Flatten or break down into pieces no larger 4 feet Remove all packing material (Styrofoam blocks, peanuts, bubble wrap, etc)



PUBLIC SAFETY AWARENESS: PEDESTRIAN SAFETY

Walk This Way! Taking Steps for Pedestrian Safety

Take steps to be safe when walking on roadways. This includes exercising caution at intersections and crosswalks and increasing your visibility at night by wearing reflective clothing and carrying flashlights.

Walking is good for your health, and it's good for the environment too. But before you head out on foot for a stroll, power walk, or errand, there are important safety tips to remember.

What's the problem?

Pedestrians—people who travel by foot, wheelchair, stroller, or similar means—are among the most vulnerable users of the road.

- ◆ In the next 24 hours, on average, 430 people will be treated in an emergency department for traffic-related pedestrian injuries. In the next 2 hours, on average, one pedestrian will die from injuries in a traffic crash.
- ◆ A total of 4,735 pedestrians were killed in traffic deaths in 2013, and more than 156,000 were treated in emergency departments for nonfatal injuries. With numbers like these, it's critical to understand the risks and learn how to stay safe.

Who's at risk?

Pedestrians of all ages are at risk of injury or death from traffic crashes, but some people are at higher risk.

- ◆ Male pedestrians are more likely to die or be injured in a motor vehicle crash than females.
- ◆ Teen and young adult (ages 15-29 years) pedestrians are more likely to be treated in emergency departments for crash-related injuries compared to any other age group.
- ◆ The rate of pedestrian death generally increases with age.
- ◆ In 2013, 34% of all pedestrians killed in traffic crashes had a blood alcohol concentration of greater than or equal to 0.08 grams per deciliter.
- ◆ As pedestrians, children are at even greater risk of injury or death from traffic crashes due to their small size, inability to judge distances and speeds, and lack of experience with traffic rules.
- ◆ One in five traffic deaths among children ages 14 and under are pedestrian deaths.

Take Steps for Safety

Whenever you're walking, keep these tips in mind:

- ◆ Whenever possible, cross the street at a designated crosswalk or intersection.
- ◆ Increase your visibility at night by carrying a flashlight and wearing reflective clothing.
- ◆ It's safest to walk on a sidewalk, but if one is not available, walk on the shoulder and face traffic.
- ◆ Avoid distractions such as electronic devices that take your attention off the road.



What Happens When It Rains?




Rain is an important part of nature's water cycle, but there are times it can do more damage than good. Problems related to storm water runoff can include:




Flooding caused by too much storm water flowing over hardened surfaces such as roads and parking lots, instead of soaking into the ground.

Increases in spending on maintaining storm drains and the storm sewer system that become clogged with excessive amounts of dirt and debris.



Decreases in sportfish populations because storm water carries sediment and pollutants that degrade important fish habitat.

More expensive treatment technologies to remove harmful pollutants carried by storm water into our drinking water supplies.



Closed beaches due to high levels of bacteria carried by storm water that make swimming unsafe.

We can help rain restore its good reputation while protecting our health and environment while saving money for ourselves and our community. Keep reading to find out how...

Restoring Rain's Reputation: What Everyone Can Do To Help

Rain by nature is important for replenishing drinking water supplies, recreation, and healthy wildlife habitats. It only becomes a problem when pollutants from our activities like car maintenance, lawn care, and dog walking are left on the ground for rain to wash away. Here are some of the most important ways to prevent storm water pollution:

- ◆ Properly dispose of hazardous substances such as used oil, cleaning supplies and paint—never pour them down any part of the storm sewer system and report anyone who does.
- ◆ Use pesticides, fertilizers, and herbicides properly and efficiently to prevent excess runoff.
- ◆ Look for signs of soil and other pollutants, such as debris and chemicals, leaving construction sites in storm water runoff or tracked into roads by construction vehicles. Report poorly managed construction sites that could impact storm water runoff to your community. (See the back of this brochure for contact information.)
- ◆ Install innovative storm water practices on residential property, such as rain barrels or rain gardens, that capture storm water and keep it on site instead of letting it drain away into the storm sewer system.
- ◆ Report any discharges from storm water outfalls during times of dry weather—a sign that there could be a problem with the storm sewer system.
- ◆ Pick up after pets and dispose of their waste properly. No matter where pets make a mess—in a backyard or at the park—storm water runoff can carry pet waste from the land to the storm sewer system to a stream.
- ◆ Store materials that could pollute storm water indoors and use containers for outdoor storage that do not rust or leak to eliminate exposure of materials to storm water.
