## Seven Fields Message to Towne Park Pool Members:

The Mayor, Council members and the Borough Office have all received numerous complaints and concerns related to the pool operations this past pool season. In light of the complaints, it is felt there is an obligation to outline the recruitment efforts for pool staff. We truly hope that everyone understands that OUR number one priority is to ensure the safety of our customers. Not unlike the surrounding community pools, the Borough experienced great difficulties with staffing and consistent daily operations of the community pool. There is a strong desire to hire a pool manager & assistant pool manager with managerial backgrounds that are able to work opposite hours to ensure proper oversight of the pool's operations at all times. Unfortunately, we were unable to find those candidates even with offering competitive wages of \$16.00 an hour for pool manager & \$14.00 an hour for assistant pool manager. As you can see from the timeline below, Borough Administration advertised with three (3) local colleges, two (2) local high schools and throughout the community with the monthly newsletter in an attempt to meet the staffing needs of the pool. Borough Administration is reviewing the recruitment and management processes expecting an improvement with the pool operations for next year and into the future. We also need to emphasize that we are hiring young adults that go on multiple family vacations, participate in extracurricular activities, and/or just want to work limited hours. We sincerely apologize and hope 2017 will be a better pool season for everyone.





### False Alarms

While home alarm systems may provide residents with some peace of mind and security, they sometimes create problems for emergency personnel. Alarms, at times, go off for no apparent reason or for reasons other than the threat of an intruder or fire, alerting emergency personnel to respond. As a result, police and other emergency personnel are forced to respond to false alarms on an all to frequent basis. As a result, the Borough has adopted policies regarding false alarms.

#### In Accordance with Ordinance #34—False Alarm (s)

Residents are reminded: A false alarm is defined as any alarm to which the police, fire or ambulance responds resulting from the activation of an alarm device when a crime, fire or other emergency warranting immediate action by the police, fire department or ambulance has not in fact occurred.

Accidental false alarms. Any person causing accidental false alarms for any reason shall pay to the Borough of Seven Fields a charge for each and every accidental false alarm to which the police, fire and/or EMS or other emergency service responds, in each calendar year, as follows:

First alarm each year .....	No Charge
Second to fifth alarm each year .....	\$100.00
Sixth to tenth alarm each year .....	\$200.00
Ten or more alarms each year .....	\$250.00







# LEAD in Drinking Water

## HEALTH EFFECTS OF LEAD

Lead is found throughout the environment in lead-based paint, air, soil, household dust, food, certain types of pottery porcelain and pewter, and water. Lead can pose a significant risk to your health if too much of it enters your body.

Lead builds up in the body over many years and can cause damage to the brain, red blood cells and kidneys. The greatest risk is to young children and pregnant women. Amounts of lead that won't hurt adults can slow down normal mental and physical development of growing bodies. In addition, a child at play often comes into contact with sources of lead contamination - like dirt and dust - that rarely affect an adult. It is important to wash children's hands and toys often, and to try to make sure they only put food in their mouths.



## LEAD IN DRINKING WATER

Lead in drinking water, although rarely the sole cause of lead poisoning, can significantly increase a person's total lead exposure, particularly the exposure of infants who drink baby formulas and concentrated juices that are mixed with water. EPA estimates that drinking water can make up 20 percent or more of a person's total exposure to lead.

THE UNITED STATES ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY (EPA) and (a) are concerned about lead in your drinking water. Some drinking water samples taken from this facility have lead levels above the EPA action level of 15 parts per billion (ppb), or 0.015 milligrams of lead per liter of water (mg/L). Under Federal law we are required to have a program in place to minimize lead in your drinking water by (b)

This program includes:

- 1) Corrosion control treatment (treating the water to make it less likely that lead will dissolve into the water);
- 2) Source water treatment (removing any lead that is in the water at the time it leaves our treatment facility); and
- 3) A public education program.

This poster also explains the simple steps you can take to protect yourself by reducing your exposure to lead in drinking water.

## HOW LEAD ENTERS OUR WATER

Lead is unusual among drinking water contaminants in that it seldom occurs naturally in water supplies like rivers and lakes. Lead enters drinking water primarily as a result of the corrosion, or wearing away, of materials containing lead in the water distribution system and household plumbing. These materials include lead-based solder used to join

copper pipe, brass and chrome-plated brass faucets, and in some cases, pipes made of lead that connect houses and buildings to water mains (service lines). In 1986, Congress banned the use of lead solder containing greater than 0.2% lead, and restricted the lead content of faucets, pipes and other plumbing materials to 8.0%.

When water stands in lead pipes or plumbing systems containing lead for several hours or more, the lead may dissolve into your drinking water. This means the first water drawn

from the tap in the morning, or later in the afternoon if the water has not been used all day, can contain fairly high levels of lead.

## STEPS YOU CAN TAKE to Reduce Exposure to Lead in Drinking Water

**1. FLUSH YOUR SYSTEM.** Let the water run from the tap before using it for drinking or cooking any time the water in a faucet has gone unused for more than six hours. The longer water resides in plumbing the more lead it may contain. Flushing the tap means running the cold water faucet for about 15-30 seconds. Although toilet flushing or showering flushes water through a portion of the plumbing system, you still need to flush the water in each faucet before using it for drinking or cooking. Flushing tap water is a simple and inexpensive measure you can take to protect your health. It usually uses less than one to two gallons of water.

**2. USE ONLY COLD WATER FOR COOKING AND DRINKING.** Do not cook with, or drink water from the hot water tap. Hot water can dissolve more lead more quickly than cold water. If you need hot water, draw water from the cold tap and then heat it.

**3. USE BOTTLED WATER.** The steps described above will reduce the lead concentrations in your drinking water. However, if you are still concerned, you may wish to use bottled water for drinking and cooking.

## PUBLIC SAFETY AWARENESS:

### Spooky Truths Regarding Halloween Safety On and Off the Road

For some, the magic of Halloween is veiled in the mystery of faces covered by frightening masks or the glee of toddlers dressed in cute costumes. For others, it's the trick-or-treating, classroom dress-up parties or family trips to a neighborhood haunted house.

For moms and dads, often there is a fine line between Halloween fun and safety concerns, especially when it comes to road and pedestrian safety.

In 2013, an estimated 6,100 pedestrian deaths and 160,000 medically consulted nonfatal injuries occurred among pedestrians in motor vehicle incidents, according to *Injury Facts 2015*, the statistical report on unintentional injuries created by the National Safety Council. (NSC).

NSC research revealed the reasons for pedestrian deaths and injuries varied by age. Darting or running into the road accounted for about 70 percent of pedestrian deaths or injuries for those age 5 to 9 and about 47 percent of incidents for those 10 to 14.

In the U.S., October ranked No. 2 in motor vehicle deaths by month. The NSC list put August first, with 3,370 deaths, followed by October, 3,200, and September, 3,170.

### Follow These Ghoulishly Good Best Practices

To help ensure adults and children have a safe holiday, the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP) has compiled a list of Halloween Safety Tips, including do's and don'ts on the trick-or-treat trail:

- ◆ A parent or responsible adult should always accompany young children through the neighborhood rounds
- ◆ If your older children are going alone, plan and review the route that is acceptable to you
- ◆ Agree on a specific time when children should return home
- ◆ Only go to homes with a porch light on and never enter a home or car for a treat

**Children and adults are reminded to put electronic devices down, keep heads up and walk, don't run, across the street.**

### Safety Tips for Motorists

Watch for children walking on roadways, medians and curbs

- ◆ Enter and exit driveways and alleys carefully
- ◆ At twilight and later in the evening, watch for children in dark clothing



## Butler County Department of Waste Management & Recycling News

### Help Prevent Fires in Waste and Recycling Trucks

A truckload of recyclables or trash can catch fire, smolder, spontaneously combust, or become toxic as a result of incompatible waste mixing inside a collection truck. This can potentially jeopardize the health and safety of the driver of the collection truck as well as the public. This can occur in neighborhoods while collecting recycling and trash or on public roadways, and can damage personal property and collection vehicles.

Fires occur because of improper disposal of material in a recycling or trash container that is incompatible and reacts when mixed with other waste in a collection vehicle. The combination of incompatible chemicals such as household bleach and ammonia can be lethal.

Depending on the types of household chemicals, the results can be a catastrophe waiting to happen -- injuring workers, family members, neighbors, pets, and the environment. Carefully sorting or separately containing household chemicals in your trash container is still risky business. When trash is collected, it is compacted in the truck to make room for more refuse. The compaction process makes it possible for incompatible materials to mix together.

Household chemicals such as pesticides, fertilizers, automotive fluids (including oil and antifreeze), paints and paint thinners, and pool chemicals should be used to the last drop. Leftover products should be properly labeled and stored for recycling or disposal at one of Butler County's Household Hazardous Waste Collections.



#### The following items should never be placed in recycling or trash containers:



- ◆ Hot ashes (cigarette paraphernalia, hot coals and/or wood)
- ◆ Motor oil, gasoline, antifreeze, kerosene
- ◆ Paint, varnish, pesticides or other household chemicals
- ◆ Auto batteries, rechargeable NiCad or Lithium batteries
- ◆ Cooking oil from fryers
- ◆ Live ammunition
